This idea for exchange parties with the men's dorms was so well-liked that more were planned for the future. We're glad they're so successful, but we think they should have been started long, long ago!

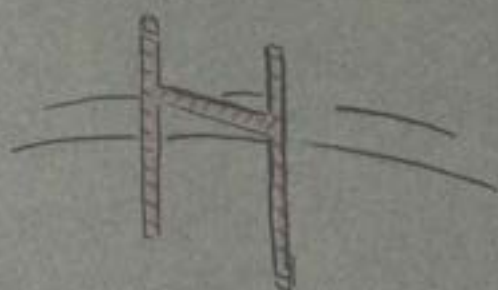

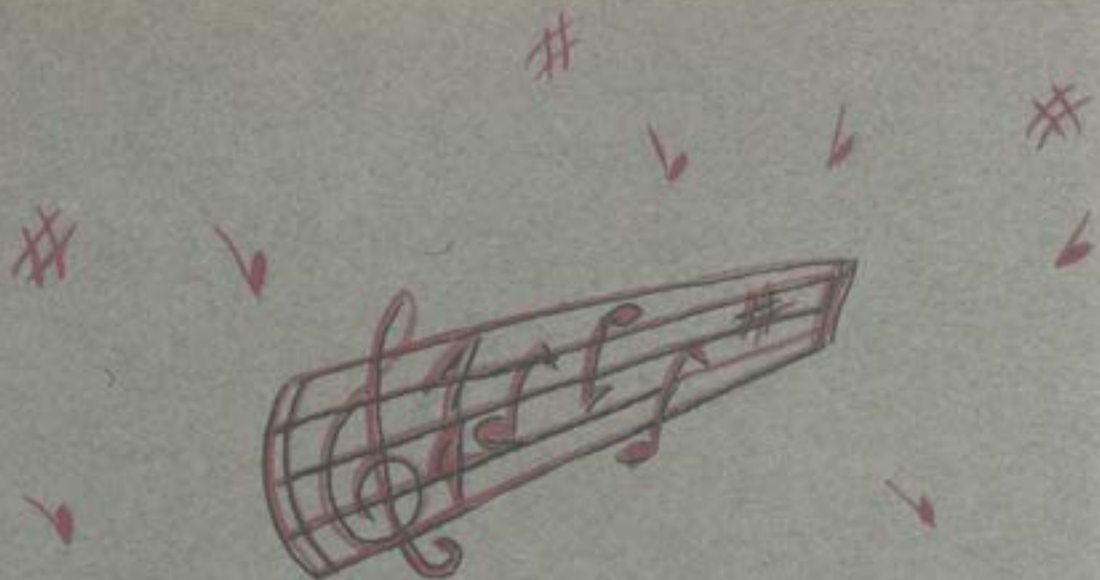

As now she climbs that golden stair.

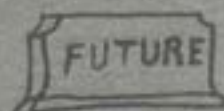
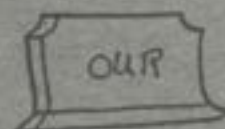
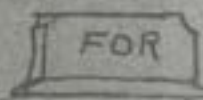
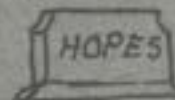
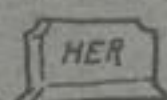
And now my friends it's time to part
