Suzuki Book III

- Fewer new skills introduced
 - o Use it to clean up and solidify skills
 - o Use it for remediation
 - o Skip pieces if they are not needed
- Develop reading skills
- Develop musical skill and expression
- Introducing more advanced techniques needed in Book IV and beyond

Left hand skills and finger patterns

- All possible 1st position finger patterns
- All accidentals
- Independent fingers, when to leave fingers down
- Fingering perfect 5^{ths}: covering two strings, etc.
- Doublestops

Bow strokes, bowings and rhythms

- Refine and develop martelé, détaché and legato bow strokes
- More sophisticated bow distribution
- Various slur patterns
- Up bow staccato

Music reading

- Meter and rhythmic awareness, stresses
- Continue with Kodàly syllable system, introduce 'counting'
- Intervals: visually (reading), spatially and aurally
- Keys and key signatures: identify key, major, relative minor, parallel minor, modulations, etc.

Introduce and develop the following techniques

- Shifting
- Vibrato
- Spiccato and off the string strokes
- Doublestops

Other musical and technical skills

- Constant attention to set up and basic technique
- Intonation development
- Tone color, dynamics and expression

- Form
- Memorization skills
- Focus and concentration
- Performance skills
- Ensemble skills
